The ACEL New Voice Scholarships are awarded to education leaders whose work has made a significant impact in their field.

The scholarship recognises forward thinking, contextually relevant and responsive educational leaders whose work has had an impact above and beyond their immediate context.

This is the third year ACEL has awarded the *New Voice scholarships*, with 55 talented educators across all states and territories recognised and rewarded for their work.

After speaking with a colleague, who recommended he apply, Andrew completed a short essay, attached his CV with two referee statements and was selected, along with four others, out of over 100 applicants.

The scholarship is combined of four main components. Firstly, the opportunity to attend and be a part of the Australian College of Education Leaders (ACEL) National Conference being held in Sydney 4-6 October. The second component is membership into ACEL and access to ACEL resources. The third component involves presenting at the conference and being given the opportunity to write an article for ACEL's Perspectives publication. The fourth and most important part is the opportunity to be connected with ACEL Branch (Principal Suzanne Fern of St Aloysius Primary School, Chisholm, is a member of the NSW Executive, newly appointed for 2017-2020).

"It is this latter component that is the most exciting, as it will provide opportunities to work collaboratively and along-side expert educators throughout NSW and nationally," said Mr Cornwall.

"In my application I focused on my work in the area of technology for teaching, learning, and school operation. I am particularly proud of the work that the Learning Technology and ICT team have done in getting MNConnect rolled out in the diocese.

"ACEL is an organisation that seeks to 'inspire, support, recognise, and advocate for excellence in educational leadership.



## SAINT BEDE'S SACRED SPACE





As outlined in one of our earlier newsletters, you will notice a sacred space at the entrance to the foyer of our Office at 39 Heritage Drive Chisholm. Sacred spaces in our Catholic schools are important as they give a visual expression of the our faith in Jesus Christ as our saviour. The brief outline on the significance of the Book of the Gospels that is pictured above is the second explanation of how the items on this space are all intertwined.

This beautiful gift from Bishop Bill and the Catholic Schools Office is strategically placed in centre of our sacred Space as it underpins all that we do as a Catholic school. The Book of the Gospels is used for the order of our Holy Masses and will therefore be proudly displayed and used at our liturgical celebrations.

The Gospel readings is the finale to the readings that we hear each Sunday. The readings before this come from both the Old and New Testaments which are structured in such a way that thematic links between the Jewish scriptures are connected to the scriptures based on Jesus Christ and his followers. The Gospel readings from Matthew, Mark, Luke and John are centred around the life, actions, stories and messages of Jesus Christ which in turn provides a pathway for how we should live our lives and the hope of eternal life after death. The four Gospel values of love, truth, compassion and justice chosen as the basis for our St Bede's Foundation Plan. How we live by these and some of the other values from the Gospel will determine how successful we are in building a truly authentic Catholic community, only some of the values that are found within the Gospels.

Well attended with a real positive sense of support and excitement, the sessions were a great opportunity to meet some of our new staff that will join our staff team at the start of next term. Brett Donohoe (our incoming Assistant Principal), Jasmine Hutchinson (our incoming Student Coordinator), Amy Stoddard (our incoming Learning Support Coordinator), Elizabeth Brown (our architect), and Rachel Quirk (our Office Manager) all gave informative and easy to listen to presentations. It was also an opportunity for me to give an up-date on the many developments, including staffing and resourcing.

Amongst the information shared was an up-date on the building project and on our 'Flexible Learning Village' which will be our temporary school site for Term 1. With the Catholic Schools Office electing to invest a significant amount of money in this part of our school site, we can now be confident that students will commence in a suitable and air conditioned learning environment before moving into the first of four buildings in Term 2. The 'Flexible Learning Village' will also provide additional options for our use and a buffer should any of the other buildings have any unexpected delays.

One of the other items discussed was an up-date on the school uniforms which included a show and tell presentation. As outlined at the evening session, all contract negotiations with Williamson has been concluded and is signed off. Garment prices will be published at the start of Term 4, along with details of fittings and ordering.



The company appointed to do the first stage of the Building Project is North Construction.
